The regular quarterly meeting of the Region H Regional Homeland Security Oversight Committee was held on January 19, 2021, at the Region H Hazmat Building, 312 W. Colorado Ave., St. Joseph Mo., 64504 and via Zoom.

- 1. Roll Call: Chair Blair Shock called the meeting to order at 13:32. A verbal roll call was taken. Twelve (12) primaries/alternates from different disciplines attended in person or via Zoom. There was a quorum.
- **Approve agenda:** Blair Shock asked if there were any corrections/additions to the agenda before asking for a motion to approve the agenda as presented. Bruce Lundy made the motion, and Bill Lamar seconded. The motion
- 3. Approve Meeting Minutes:
 - October 13, 2021 Chair Blair Shock asked for a motion to approve the minutes. Blake Rudel made the motion to approve the minutes, and it was seconded by Adam Perry. The motion passed unanimously.
- 4. Reports:
 - **OHS Update:** Kristin Kayser informed everyone that FY21 applications are under review for revisions and once those are complete, the projects will be set up in WebGrants. Region H had submitted all of the required paperwork, Kayser added. Hayley asked if the FY22 grant application period would be similar to last year's and while OHS hasn't received official word, it looks like the application will open up in May as was the case last year.
 - Local/Regional Efforts & Initiatives: Bill Brinton announced that MoDOT and the Missouri State Highway Patrol are coordinating to launch a planning team that would draft a regional transportation response plan and said he would send those details out to the group. There is also a Traffic Incident Management training Feb. 3 from 5-9 pm at the Remington Nature Center in St. Joseph.
 - Chairperson's Update: Blair reviewed upcoming training opportunities in the area, including ICS EOC training in Cameron March 10; ICS 300 training Sept. 19-21 and ICS400 training Dec. 5-6 at the Caldwell County Sheriff's office in Kingston; a Dept. of Agriculture Annex workshop March 23 and Disaster Shelter & Handling of Animals Sept. 28-29 at the HazMat building in St. Joseph.
- 5. Regional Grant Updates: Hayley Howard, Mo-Kan Regional Council, highlighted grant updates that were included in the committee packets:
 - FY2019: Hayley stated that spending was complete on all projects except Work Plan, and that an extension was approved to hire a THIRA consultant pending Mo-Kan board approval. Three quotes were received and Mo-Kan staff chose low bidder. Once approved, George Albert, former fire chief and Region H training coordinator, will be hired to lead the update.
 - **FY2020:** Hayley reported that order for the NTA Ambulance Portable Radios project, the only open project for FY20, is delayed. Paul Stickler with Midwest Mobile gave an update saying that a computer chip shortage is part

- of the reason for the delay. The FY20 Period of Performance ends August 31, 2022, and final claims must be submitted by Oct. 15, 2022.
- **FY2021**: Hayley reminded the committee of the FY21 projects and stressed that no work can occur on those projects until the State sets them up in WebGrants.

6. Committee Review / Vacancies / Updates:

Hayley stated the volunteer organization alternate and agriculture primary positions remain open. The committee voted to move Ruben Bulgin from agriculture alternate to primary, with Adam Perry motioning and Bill Brinton seconding. Bill Brinton motioned to make Bill Caldwell, External Relations with Mo American Red Cross, the volunteer organization alternate. Adam Perry seconded. Both motions unanimously passed.

7. New / Other Business:

- THIRA update: Hayley said she reached out to Kevin Virgin who is in charge of THIRA at OHS, and he said they should be sending out the 2022 update information soon and the update will be due sometime in December 2022.
- 8. Next Meeting: The date for the next meeting is April 20, 2022, at 13:30.
- **9. Adjourn:** The meeting adjourned at 14:06.

FY 2022 SHSP Application Workshop

The Application Workshop will be available on the DPS website at https://dps.mo.gov/dir/programs/ohs/grantstraining/. An invitation to the workshop will be sent when the application period opens. The OHS strongly recommends all applicants review the application workshop before completing and submitted an application to ensure all requirements are met.

FY 2022 Application Peer Reviewer/Scorer Information

- Each RHSOC will appoint regional representatives as peer reviewers to score applications in WebGrants
- Each RHSOC is encouraged to have representation from each discipline but a minimum of 5 peer reviewer/scorers is required
- Reviewers must sign and submit conflict of interest forms and must be setup in WebGrants prior to scoring
- If a reviewer has a conflict with one or more applications, they will be required to abstain from scoring the conflicted application(s)
- Training for application reviewers/scorers will be held in July 2022. The training invitation will follow at a later date
- Reviewers/Scorers will have two weeks to score applications
- RHSOC will want to discuss who will represent the region and participate as reviewers/scorers for FY 2022 at today's meeting. Regional Planning Commissions/Councils of Government will send to the OHS as soon as possible

FY 2022 SHSP Law Enforcement Terrorism Prevention Activities (LETPA)

- FY 2022 SHSP LETPA application period is TBD
- Same requirements as FY 2020 and FY 2021 are anticipated
 - o Project must support law enforcement terrorism prevention activities
 - Applicants that intend to apply for LETPA funding must first apply for the requested project through their respective Regional Homeland Security Oversight Committee (RHSOC) to be considered eligible for LETPA funding. State units of government are exempt from this requirement

2022 Missouri Office of Homeland Security THIRA/SPR Scenario List

The following scenarios have been developed to support the completion of the 2022 THIRA/SPR for the State of Missouri. Because each Region around the state is different and can vary widely between population density, critical infrastructure, tourism and industry a one size fits all approach for the scenario can become unrealistic at the local level.

Because all whole community input forms, including the one for the state, are averaged together to create the THIRA, it is more efficient if all scenarios follow a similar outline to one another. For the 2022 THIRA/SPR we are asking each Region to use one of the following; the State scenario, a derivative of the State scenario, or create your own scenario that aligns with the "general category' that is attached to each scenario below. We would also ask that you follow the general naming conventions outlined below. For example; if you wanted to use the Severe Weather Event 2022 (MO) scenario as is, or a portion of it (tornado only for example) you would title your scenario Severe Weather Event 2022 (MO), if you wish to create your own scenario using the information contained in the "general" section you would name your scenario Severe Weather Event 2022 (*Your Region*).

<u>General</u>: **Severe Weather**: May include any type of severe weather to include flash flooding, major flooding, high wind, tornado, ice, snow, extreme cold, extreme heat, drought and space weather. Type, timing and intensity may vary in accordance with historical events within Missouri.

Specific: Severe Weather Event 2022 (MO): An above average winter snow accumulation combined with warm early spring has created a significant amount of melting from the northern snowpack. Reservoirs located along the upper Missouri River are at capacity and are expected to begin increasing their flow. Atmospheric conditions combine to create a weather system that affects the state for the next two months. Periods of torrential rain create flash flood conditions, storm systems produce damaging winds, cloud to ground lightning and several tornadoes, including one long track tornado that does extensive damage to several communities. The historic amount of rainfall associated with the storm systems along with the abundance of water already in the river system leads to long term flooding, and some levee failures. Multiple small communities experience flooding damage, approximately 390 roads are closed and multiple low water bridges are damaged.

<u>General:</u> **Pandemic:** May include any type of pandemic to include terrorism. Non-specific in origin or impact, but will generally include a 20% infection rate, and up to 5% morbidity rate.

<u>Specific:</u> **Pandemic Event 2022 (MO):** Starting in late September to early October, Missouri experiences a severe pandemic outbreak of Type A Influenza that lasts for 12 weeks. The Influenza affects 25% of the population and has a 5% fatality rate. Many citizens become ill and seek care or stay home. Others stay home from work or school to avoid infection, or to care for others. This results in infrastructure degradation and economic slowdown due to worker shortage. It also results in a staffing shortage at hospitals and public health agencies impacting countermeasure distribution and patient care.

<u>General:</u> **Biological:** For the purpose of THIRA scenario building it may be deliberate (CBRNE) or accidental (Haz-Mat). It may also be Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear, or enhanced Explosive. May affect humans, livestock or both. Type, timing and intensity could vary.

<u>Specific:</u> **Biological Event 2022 (MO):** In the spring several thousand head of cattle are deliberately exposed to a variant of the Foot and Mouth Disease virus while awaiting sale at the Joplin Regional

Stockyards and at the Springfield Livestock Marketing Center. From these two areas the undiagnosed cattle are sold off to a number of feedlots and local farms around the Midwest, potentially exposing well over 100,000+ head of cattle to infection. Economic impact to the State of Missouri is estimated at over 1 Billion dollars in lost revenue, and labor income, with an estimated \$151 million in lost state tax revenue.

Specific: CBRNE Event 2022 (MO): In September at a large outdoor college sporting event with moderate cloud cover, 70,000 people from across the region gather at the area. A person/persons operating a UAV swarm of at least 5 drones spray weaponized anthrax over the crowd. Most if not all attendees are contaminated, including those outside the stadium who evacuated the area as soon as they saw what was happening. Approximately 21,000 persons inhale the Anthrax spore, 31 people are killed in the panic along with another 300 injured. The injured are either treated on scene and released, or transported to the hospital, potentially spreading the Anthrax spores to the local medical facilities. Within three days following the incident, 7,000 inhalation anthrax casualties begin to present at area hospitals with symptoms. Seventy-five percent of the casualties are fatal. An additional 1,200 patients present to area hospitals with cutaneous anthrax infections.

<u>General</u>: **Complex Coordinated Terrorist Attack**: Method of attack and target selection may vary, will be multiple locations. Intensity and consequences could vary.

Specific: Complex Coordinated Terrorist Attack 2022 (MO): It's Wednesday March 11th at 11:30 A.M., in Jefferson City, MO. A large pro-choice rally is being held on the south lawn of the Missouri State Capitol while an equally large rally of pro-choice proponents meet in the first and second floor rotunda areas of the capitol building. The legislative body is in attendance at their offices or in the House and Senate chambers and at least three school groups are scheduled to tour the capitol building today. In total there will be approximately 1,500 additional visitors in the capitol building today. At 11:31 A.M., a white panel van pulls into a local fast food restaurant, near two school buses that are unloading their passengers for lunch. As the white panel van approaches, it detonates its explosive payload instantly killing 8, and injuring another 52. Injuries sustained include flash burns, penetrating wounds, concussion injuries and traumatic amputations. The majority of the victims are under the age of 14. At 11:36 A.M., as the rally on the south lawn begins to wind down a white panel van stops on a city street overlooking the south lawn and an individual with a rifle begins firing towards the crowd gathered on the lawn, before speeding off westbound down the street. The gunman kills 2, wounding 11 and another 8 will be treated for injuries sustained as the crowd rushes to find cover from the gunfire. In the confusion of individuals seeking to get back into the capitol building, and Capitol Police officers deploying to engage the shooter, security is bypassed and two male subjects infiltrate into the building with the crowd. Once inside, the two male subjects begin firing into the groups of people crowded inside the building. The attackers also deploy IED's similar to pipe bombs in the attack, some explode and some appear to be either defective or on a timer. This phase of the attack results in 18 killed and 43 wounded. As the attackers make their way towards the Governor's office they are engaged by responding Capitol Police Officers and divert to a nearby office where they barricade themselves with 6 hostages. While the attack in the capitol is ongoing, a white panel van slows down in front of a popular ice cream location. From an open side door a gunman shoots into the customers waiting in line before speeding off southbound. In this attack 1 person is killed and 5 are injured. Security personnel at one of the two hospitals in town observe a white panel van parked near the entrance to the emergency room. Security protocols at the hospital are enacted and the hospital is locked down, with full patient diversion.

<u>General:</u> **Cyber:** May be deliberate, accidental or the work of a foreign nation state. Consequences could impact local, state and national systems.

<u>Specific:</u> **Cyber Event 2022 (MO):** On April 12th, a coordinated Distributed Denial of Service attack begins across multiple gaming platforms. As the day progresses the DDoS moves to other platforms causing widespread internet service disruptions. As providers begin to bring systems back on line several large financial institutions are hit with a concentrated cyber-attack on the central clearing house platforms and transfer systems, disrupting payments, transfers and account clearing. The ripple effect of this financial shutdown rapidly impacts smaller financial institutions, causing a local liquidation of financial assets by account holders. On April 14th power generation facilities begin going offline due to the interdiction of the "Happy Clown" data-wiping worm that has infiltrated the SCADA systems that control electrical power distribution. Wide spread regional and statewide power outages and brownouts impact all sectors to include communications. Stable power production takes 3 weeks to restore.

<u>General</u>: **Technological**: May include any type of system failure, deliberate or routine, that impacts any type of critical infrastructure such as dams, energy grid, internet connectivity, pipelines, transportation or logistical networks. May be the result of a non-kinetic attack by a foreign adversary.

Specific: Technological Event 2022 (MO): In late July, the remnants of Hurricane Judy stall out over central Missouri dropping approximately 22 inches of rain over the course of 72 hours. The torrential rains causing the Ozark flood basin to rapidly fill. At approximately 1:30 P.M. Truman Dam suffers a catastrophic failure from an under-cut bank. The town of Warsaw has approximately 2 hours of warning. Nine hours later the flood waters from the Truman Dam failure reach the Lake of the Ozarks. Bagnell Dam is quickly overtopped by 25 feet of water and suffers a catastrophic failure as well. The water reaches St. Charles, MO approximately 108 hours later causing significant flooding damage. In all 3,000 homes are destroyed, 1500 structures damaged, there are 256 fatalities, 200 missing and 68 injured. The Osage River Bridge at Osage Beach and the Highway 17 Bridge at Tuscumbia are both closed due to potential structural damage with many roads and bridges in the downstream flood plain impassable. The estimated damage total is approximately 20 Billion dollars. The long term effects include loss of revenue at the Lake of the Ozarks and loss of property values of all structures built around the lakes, in addition to the flood control capability of both reservoirs.

<u>General</u>: **Earthquake**: May include an earthquake localized to the epicenter up to a catastrophic event (7.7+) causing complete destruction in the impact zone, widespread liquefaction and a long period of aftershocks.

Specific: New Madrid Seismic Zone (NMSZ) Event 2022 (MO): At approximately 1400 hours an earthquake, with a magnitude of at least 7.7, occurs along the New Madrid Fault near the town of New Madrid, Missouri. Schools, businesses, and factories are open and transportation routes are busy. Springtime rains, combined with the unique geology of the New Madrid Seismic Zone results in large scale liquefaction damage throughout the region. Forty-seven counties within the state, including the City of St. Louis experience strong shaking and damage. Extensive damage to structures, roadways, bridges, utilities, and railways are reported. 1,606 fatalities are reported, 732,447 buildings are damaged to some degree with 47,549 of them destroyed. Loss estimates exceed 63 billion dollars. 1,144,225 people are without water and 364,335 are without power. An estimated 237,000 people evacuated will require sheltering after the earthquake. Even regions that were not directly impacted by the earthquake will be affected by the event. Large scale sheltering operations are likely to be spread out around the state, in addition to numerous logistic and responder base camps. Evacuation and response routes will cross unaffected areas of Missouri, potentially impacting local responder agencies.



What is Avian Influenza?

Avian Influenza (AI) is caused by an influenza type A virus which can infect poultry. Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) is a serious disease and requires rapid response because it is highly contagious and often fatal to poultry. The goal is to quickly contain and eradicate the disease, protecting our poultry industry, and in turn, the American consumer.

Biosecurity Guidelines

Keep your Distance

- Restrict visitor access to your birds
- Prevent contact with wild birds (especially waterfowl)
- Refrain from visiting other poultry production locations

Keep it Clean

- Have dedicated clothing and footwear when working with your birds
- · Disinfect footwear before entering your barn or coop
- · Wash hands with soap and water before and after handling your birds

Wildlife Control

- Reduce availability of food, water and any potential nesting areas for wild birds
- Fix holes in roofs, screens and walls of poultry barns or coops

Don't Haul the Virus Home

- Clean and disinfect all wheels on vehicles that have visited a poultry farm
- · Clean and disinfect all equipment borrowed from other poultry producers

Know the Symptoms

- · Decrease in water or feed consumption
- · Ouietness among the flock
- Decrease in egg production
- Sudden increase of death in your flock

Don't wait to report sick birds.

Missouri Department of Agriculture Update

Foreign Animal Disease (FAD) Preparedness and Response: African Swine Fever Virus, Foot & Mouth Disease Virus and High Pathogenic Avian Influenza virus are the three major viruses circulating in the world that could devastate the Missouri poultry and livestock industries. MDA is continuing to work with stakeholders to develop biosecurity plans and Secure Food Supply Plans (Secure Beef, Secure Pork, Secure Poultry, Secure Milk, and Secure Sheep and Wool) that will help keep continuity of business in the event of a disease outbreak. MDA staff are participating in national and regional FAD exercises, allowing existing emergency plans to be updated to meet current policies and protocols.

High Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) Detected in Missouri: On March 4, 2022, Missouri had a HPAI H5N1 confirmed positive in a commercial broiler chicken farm in Stoddard County and a backyard flock of poultry and waterfowl in Bates County. March 7, 2022, a commercial turkey farm in Jasper County was confirmed positive for HPAI H5N1. March 8, 2022, a turkey breeder farm in Lawrence County was confirmed positive for HPAI H5N1. March 14, 2022, a backyard flock of poultry and waterfowl was confirmed positive for HPAI H5N1 in Ralls County. March 26, 2022, a backyard flock of poultry and waterfowl was confirmed positive for HPAI H5N1 in Gentry County.

African Swine Fever (ASF) was detected for the first time in more than 40 years in the western hemisphere. ASF was confirmed in the Dominican Republic (DR) on July 28, 2021 in several backyard swine herds and on September 20, 2021 in Haiti in several backyard swine herds. USDA APHIS continues to work diligently with partners, including the Department of Homeland Security's U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) and U.S. swine industry, to prevent ASF from entering the United States.

DOMESTIC WATERFOWL AUCTIONS, SHOWS AND SWAP MEETS SUSPENDED THROUGH MAY DUE TO AVIAN INFLUENZA

What is Avian Influenza?

Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) is a serious disease and requires rapid response because it is highly contagious and often fatal to poultry. The goal is to quickly contain and eradicate the disease, protecting our poultry industry, and in turn, the American consumer.

Why Waterfowl?

The suspension affects domestic waterfowl, specifically, because they are more likely to comingle with wild, migrating waterfowl that carry HPAI. Also, it is proven waterfowl are less likely to show signs of HPAI, which can lead to unintentional spreading of the virus.

Suspension Applies To:

- Live Waterfowl Auctions, Shows and Swap Meets
- Waterfowl Egg Sales at Auctions and Swap Meets
- All poultry auctions, shows and swap meets in counties containing HPAI control areas or surveillance zones

*The suspension does not apply to days-old duckling sales at feed stores.

*The suspension will be reevaluated at the end of May.




